Are they really rude?

The French-speaking people of Canada have often been described by the English-speaking inhabitants of the country as being rude. But where does this stereotype come from? In numbers, the French speakers are a much smaller community than the English speakers. Whenever people from other parts of Canada came to Quebec in the past, they expected everybody to understand them when they spoke English like the way people did at home. In Quebec this was not the case. Here, French was and is the common language. So when someone tried to speak English with a person from Quebec, it was likely that they simply didn't answer. One reason might be that the person from Quebec didn't understand the English-speaking person. But, of course, they could have said so, even in French. Perhaps they were embarrassed, or they just didn't want to give it a try, which *is* rude, of course. Nowadays however, most people in Quebec speak English anyway, so the stereotype is slowly disappearing.

And as always, it is also a question of how politely you talk to people. So even if your French isn't very good, give it a try – a little 'bonjour' may open many doors and hearts in Quebec!

The EdgeWalk - Toronto's Most Extreme Attraction




